Auckland Airport congratulates Air New Zealand on its announcement that it will begin flying a direct Auckland to Houston, Texas service

Commencing mid-December, the new direct service between Auckland and Houston will see a Boeing 777-200ER aircraft operate up to five flights per week.

Norris Carter, Auckland Airport's general manager aeronautical commercial, says he is delighted by the announcement which will see an additional 126,000 seats per year added to the American market, contributing an estimated \$110 million to the New Zealand economy.

"The United States is New Zealand's third largest international tourism market with



226,600 visitor arrivals in the year ending February 2015. This is an increase of 10.3 per cent when compared to the same period the year before," says Norris.

"This new Auckland to Houston service will help stimulate further growth as it provides a direct connection between New Zealand and Texas for the first time. It also offers a new gateway for New Zealand travellers visiting popular American East Coast destinations, such as New York, allowing for more one stop connections from Auckland."

"This new direct service strengthens Auckland's position as a hub airport for Asia, Australasia and the Americas. Air New Zealand and its partner airlines offer 54 return flights per week to Asia, 110 return flights per week to Australia and, with the addition of this service in December, 30 return flights per week to the Americas," finishes Norris.

We will remember them



Auckland Airport in association with Auckland Council marked the 100 year ANZAC Day centenary with billboard imagery encouraging people to experience the 1914-1919 First World War Heritage Trail. Auckland is rich in wartime history; endowed with monuments and memorials, honour rolls with names etched in bronze, war memorial buildings, stone archways and open spaces used as camps and other wartime activities.

The Heritage Trail includes 56 sites around Auckland from Wellsford to Waiuku that enable visitors to gain an understanding of how different parts of the city were used during World War 1.

The sites can be visited in any order and are a great way to learn about the local community's contribution to the war effort and the experiences of those left on the home front.

World War 1 (1914–1918) is one of the most significant events of the 20th century. The number of New Zealanders who served overseas (120,000) equated to more than ten percent of the country's population at the time (one million). Over 40,000 were wounded and tragically, more than 18,000 died.

The imagery designed by Snapper Media, will be on display for the next couple of months on George Bolt Memorial Drive as well as on the CTV screens in the public arrivals area.

Firefighters dedicate hundreds of hours to fundraising and training in the lead up to the challenge and to date, over \$427,000 has already been raised for this year's challenge.

The event first began in 2003 when eight firefighters raced each other up the Sky Tower. Year on year the event has grown both in terms of participant numbers and also in money raised. In 2014, more than 700 firefighters completed the challenge and raised \$915,000 for LBC.
