The bright yellow Toblerone kiosk arrived at the international terminal in the last week of May and will be there until August, offering loads of specials on the famous chocolate as well as free samples.




Better yet, passengers who live in New Zealand and Australia have the opportunity to win a Vespa scooter if they buy two products from the stand.

Training amid the rubble



The pile of concrete left over from the old runway has proved a hit with local Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) handlers and their dogs.

The area is the size of about three rugby fields and 5m high, and it has lots of large concrete slabs that help volunteers practice in a simulated “pancake collapse”.

Handler Brendon Irwin, who trains in the area with his dog Joe says it’s a great place to train as there is nothing else like it in the country.

Brendon and Joe, a border collie cross, became operationally certified in May after 18 months of training so, if there is another major earthquake in the country or a person is trapped, they will be called in to help.

Brendon has been with the USAR service for nearly 10 years, getting involved through his job as a firefighter. He found out about the Airport’s rubble pile last year and, after getting in touch with Airport Emergency services crew chief Dave Ewen, it was all go as a training venue.

Local handlers and their dogs now train in the rubble twice a week. Last year, they hosted the USAR national training at the Airport, which Brendon says was a great success.


“The rubble pile was the perfect venue. We had about 16 dogs there. We have a great relationship with the Airport and we hope it can continue as long as possible.”

Looking to the East



New Zealand needs to do more to woo wealthy Chinese visitors, according to Pierre Gervois, a speaker at the recent Tourism Industry Rendevous conference (TRENZ) in Queenstown.

The conference is the biggest international trade event on the New Zealand tourism industry calendar, bringing together hundreds of tourism industry representatives to package deals for travellers around the world. Pierre, a Hong Kong tourism marketing executive, is working on Auckland Airport's recently unveiled "Luxury New Zealand" project to promote the country to China's elite



Pierre says New Zealand tourism needs to move away from a heavy focus on tour groups for Chinese tourists and instead focus on personalised itineraries and luxury experiences for them.

Husband and wife team Lilly Choi-Lee and Trevor Lee, of the Australian-based international customer service company TravConsult, echoed that message.

They offered advice on catering to the increasing volumes of travellers from India, Korea, China and Japan and say respect is key when it comes to winning over these markets.



"The core idea of the campaign is to explain to the new generation of wealthy Chinese people that New Zealand is a top luxury destination."

Recycling in public

Auckland Airport played host to the launch of the Love NZ National Recycling campaign on June 2, welcoming Environment Minister Dr Nick Smith to do the honours.

The event, organised by the Glass Packaging Forum, saw more than 70 guests assemble for speeches from the Minister, Deputy Mayor of Auckland Penny Hulse and our very own Judy Nicholl.



All speakers noted the need for government, private and public sector organisations to work together to make the Love NZ recycling programme a national success, for the Rugby World Cup and beyond.

Judy revealed that public place recycling bins were first installed at the airport in 2008. Today over 400 tonnes of public and commercial waste is recovered for recycling each year, giving the airport an impressive 27 per cent recycling rate.

Plans are afoot to improve that figure over the next few years, with changes to waste management practices set to be introduced later this year.

Science in action



Bird strikes are set to take a plunge at Auckland Airport after the introduction of a special grass called Jackal.

Developed by AgResearch scientist Chris Pennell, the grass contains a natural fungus or endophyte that produces chemicals harmless to birds, but that make them feel sick when they eat it.

The endophytic grass also reduces insect numbers, making areas where it is growing less attractive to insect-feeding birds.

Since April, about 27 hectares of the grass has been sown on the southern side of the runway and early results have been positive.

Peter Robinson, Auckland Airport grounds and wildlife hazards management planner, says staff can see from their twice-daily bird counts that fewer birds are visiting the area where the grass has been planted.

He says continued monitoring will help establish a link between reduced bird numbers and fewer bird strikes.

"It's a great trial from a scientific perspective because we have such a long history of baseline data. Sowing grass on an active airfield and monitoring it is a big unknown, but I'm expecting a really good result as far as bird strikes go."

In the thick of it



The first of four new projects in the Quad precinct is now open for business.

Construction of the Travel Careers and Training Centre finished in mid-June and the first students are already in the building.

Travel Careers and Training is one of the top 10 private training institutes in the country, including schools for cabin crews, flight attendants travel consultants and tourism professionals.

Guy Domett, the training centre's chief financial officer, says they are delighted about being at the Airport.

"It differentiates us from the rest of the market because they are in suburbia. A large number of our students want to work at the Airport one day so it's great to be right here. Strategically this has been in the pipeline for a long time so we feel we are in the right place."

The building, which features double height glazing to showcase a Boeing 737 training fuselage, is unique for New Zealand. A galley and interior of a plane will be added later this year.

This year's awards went to Jetstar, for the best airline, and to MAF Biosecurity in recognition of the critical role they play in the operational success of the airport and passenger experience.





"We want to ensure that our travellers are offered a world-class travel experience."



The airport police: Keeping Auckland Airport safe

International airports are some of the fastest growing environments within the business world and Auckland Airport is no different.

The strategic importance of border locations is enormous; to industry with its financial benefits and to government organisations tasked with ensuring the safety of the community and the millions of passengers who visit each year.

The latest growth at Auckland Airport is incredible. Within the immediate area there are three new hotels, logistics distribution centres, government buildings and a significant rise in retail outlets.

Add to the list a new entertainment area in the shape of new bars and restaurants, a national travel industry training centre, new roads and airlines and one can see that the demands upon the Airport Police are growing.


The Airport Police Intelligence team have been working closely with their police colleagues and partners at Auckland Airport to ensure that both sides of the equation are understood.

This is evident in the area of Airport Watch (a reporting channel for suspicious activity) and Crimestoppers or Integrity Plus (an anonymous crime reporting hotline).

With the Rugby World Cup in mind, and the continued growth of the airport community, your police ask that you keep talking to them, keep forwarding information and, above all, help us to help you maintain what is arguably one of the lowest crime areas in New Zealand.

Technology vs weather



There are on average about eight days of fog per year at Auckland Airport – but this year has already seen more than that.

Thanks to the Cat III B technology installed

at the Airport, however, fog is unlikely to have much effect on travel plans. The technology allows suitably trained crew on a suitably equipped aircraft to land automatically in foggy conditions.

Airfield manager Dennis Millington says without it, planes would have to divert to other airports in New Zealand or Fiji. "It allows international arrivals to land rather than divert so it allows for huge savings for airlines and it reduces travel disruptions for travellers."

Auckland has also introduced light systems on taxi ways that allow for multiple aircraft movement during fog.

"It keeps the place going, albeit with some delays," Dennis says.

Customs in the fast lane

Australian and New Zealand ePassport holders may soon find travelling between New Zealand and Australia even more like travelling domestically.

From July 2011, Australian Customs and Border Protection and New Zealand Customs will trial the integration of both countries' SmartGate systems between New Zealand's departures and Australia's arrivals.

The trial SmartGate trans-Tasman solution will give travellers the opportunity to complete part of the Australian arrivals process at the New Zealand SmartGate departures kiosk.

Eligible travellers can then go straight to the Australian SmartGate arrivals gate on arrival at the Gold Coast.

The trial SmartGate trans-Tasman solution will initially be available to Australian and New Zealand ePassport holders travelling



from Auckland International Airport to the Gold Coast Airport.

It will be gradually rolled out to other New Zealand departures-enabled international airports.
