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Auckland tops airport awards



For the fourth year in a row Auckland Airport has been named the best airport in the Australia/Pacific region at the Skytrax World Airport Awards.

It was also awarded the best staff service in the same region, and was second only to Vancouver in the best airport handling 10-20 million passengers in a year.

The awards were held in Vienna at the end of April and Auckland Airport CEO Simon Moutter says he is extremely proud the

airport has again been recognised on the world stage.

"It highlights once again that the focus of everyone across the entire airport on making journeys better continues to benefit the end consumer and help us shine in the eyes of passengers."

Incheon International Airport in Seoul scooped the title as the World's Best Airport for 2012. Six of the top 10 positions went to airports across Asia.

Airport CEO resigns

After four outstanding years in the pilot's seat at Auckland Airport, CEO Simon Moutter is leaving to fill the CEO's chair at Telecom

Simon joined the airport in May 2008 and chair Joan Withers says since then he has transformed the company's business model and focus, and built a talented and dedicated senior management team.

"For shareholders this has delivered solid returns during a period of unprecedented global market upheaval and provided excellent value to passengers, business partners and New Zealand. It has also resulted in increased passenger numbers at all four of our airports, and further improvement in the performance of our aeronautical, retail and property businesses."

In reshaping the business and in focusing on making journeys better for consumers, airlines, and business partners, Simon has made a significant contribution to Auckland



Airport and to New Zealand tourism and trade, particularly through the growth in vital air connections to important markets.

Simon takes up his new role on September 1 and Joan says the board will begin the candidate consideration process immediately.

Auckland Airport's chief financial officer Simon Robertson will become acting chief executive when Simon leaves. Simon Robertson joined the company in 2005 and has held a range of senior roles before being appointed to his current role in 2009.

Novotel recognised

Auckland Airport's Novotel hotel has been named in the NZ Architecture Awards top 20 projects within the commercial architecture category.

The convener of the New Zealand Institute of Architects awards jury, Hugh Tennant, says the standard of commercial projects was very high, indicating developers are commissioning high quality buildings despite financial constraints.



Designed by Warren and Mahoney Architects in Mt Eden, the Novotel was designed to reflect New Zealand and was opened by Maori King Tuheitia Paki on May 27, 2011, in front of 200 guests including Prime Minister John Key and Auckland Mayor Len Brown.

One of the 20 projects will be selected for the 2012 NZ Architecture Medal on May 25.

Conference Centre necessary



Auckland Airport has joined the tourism industry and business sector in asking that the significant tourism, trade and economic benefits that a national convention centre would bring should not be lost in the politics.

Airport chief executive Simon Moutter says the opportunity to gain a large-scale international quality convention centre with no financial drain on the taxpayer does not come along very often.

He points out that Auckland and New Zealand misses out on thousands of additional visitors and millions of dollars each year because they don't have a conference centre of sufficient scale to attract big international conferences.

"Convention visitors are amongst the highest spending visitors per night, spending four to five times as much per night as the average daily visitor spend.

"In addition, conventions help improve shoulder and off-peak tourism, and encourage business and trade links between New Zealand and international delegates."

Auckland Airport's general manager corporate affairs, Charles Spillane says the tourism industry has been waiting a very long time for a national convention centre. "Let's not lose sight of the bigger picture."


Air link to Indonesia a step closer

Taking care of the Marae carvings



The carvings on Auckland Airport's Te Manukanuka o Hoturoa Marae are getting a touch of TLC just over six years after they were installed in October 2006.

Maintenance carpenter Graham Allen says the carvings on the outside of the Marae were washed down a couple of weeks ago and will be inspected to see how the paint and woodwork has been treated by the elements

He and his men will need to use ladders and a hoist to reach the tallest examples, almost 8m high, but an initial look has shown the paint is starting to fade off a little, but the timber itself is in very good shape. The interior carvings will also get a wash, but will probably only need a fresh coat of preserving oil.

Te Manukanuka o Hoturoa Marae, located on Uenuku Way in the Auckland Airport Business District, is available for all to share in the Maori culture. The Marae offers an alternative conference venue, school programmes, overnight stays, short stays and can be a gathering place for most occasions.

AES welcomes new team members



Airport Emergency Services (AES) welcomed two new recruits earlier this year but only after they had gone through, and passed, an intense 15-week training programme.

It all started on October 31 when three recruits began with the basics – hose and ladder drills, the safe person concept, extinguishers, knots and waterway gear – all after a daily, hour-long physical training session that started sharp at 7am.

As the weeks progressed, the recruits learned all aspects of what is required as part of the AES role, from training in the realistic hot fire building in Whangarei where they were subject to live fire training in temperatures up to 300°C, to a pre hospital emergency care course, hazard training and

aircraft and hangar familiarisation.

One of the three trainees was withdrawn in week 10, leaving the remaining two to complete the final five weeks of theory, radio training, and a Coastguard approved Boatmasters course.

The final hurdle was a three-hour exam and the passing out parade, which put them on display in front of the friends and family who supported them through their training.

AES training officer Simon O'Leary welcomed Richard Gowdy and William Garnett to the AES family, saying they made him proud. "I would also like to take this opportunity to thank everyone, who helped and supported me to make this course such a success," Simon said.
