Flight information now displayed in eight languages

Auckland Airport expands capability of 'Australasia first' multi-language Flight Information Display boards (FIDs).

FIDs provide destination, origin and flight status information and the newly developed functionality is part of Auckland Airport's wider multi-language strategy to make journeys better for our international visitors.

Since simplified Chinese was introduced back in October 2013, further capability has been developed and additional languages phased in. Japanese, Korean, Malaysian, Tongan, Samoan, Hindi and Latin American Spanish are now displayed according to flight profile, bringing the total number of languages provided to

eight - further improving the travel experience for international passengers and customers.

The new FIDs are only one of a host of multi-language initiatives that Auckland Airport has recently introduced. The Airport has updated all the primary directional signs at the international terminal to include Chinese text. As well as this, translated versions of useful and important airport information, targeted at Chinese flights, is now available through audio and visual means.

New operating system will help improve customer experience

Auckland Airport is committed to providing the best possible experience for passengers and the new Airport Operating System has been developed to help do just that.

The new Airport Operating System (AOS) uses cutting edge technology to help the airport's operations team to have greater visibility and predictability around aircraft and passenger movements.

Rollout of the AOS kicks off in late June and is expected to take six months to complete. In addition to the useful features to the airport operations team, it will also include enhanced flight information display for passengers.

The AOS solution utilises technology from the New Zealand based company Gentrack Limited, said Greg Chisholm, Auckland Airport's business solutions manager.

"This technology lays down the foundation layer to facilitate many future Smart Airport business initiatives," says Greg.

Mark Croudace, Auckland Airport's aeronautical operations manager further commented that the operations team is looking forward to using the new technology.

"We continuously seek to improve passenger experience and drive operational efficiency and the new system will be a huge help," commented Mark.

"The breakfast was a special celebration and a great way to give back to a fantastic team," says Bella Onekawa, passenger facilitation officer at Auckland Airport.

"We are very proud of everyone, particularly those that are graduating. Many have already found full time employment in and around the airport. Volunteering as a Domestic Terminal Host provided the students with the necessary work experience to complement their studies and find work in the industry," said Bella.

Auckland Airport has two help desks at the domestic terminal managed by 22 DTHs. Over at the international terminal, there are five helpdesks and 109 bluecoats including 10 mandarin speaking ambassadors.



Jetstar turns 5 downunder

Last month, Jetstar celebrated its 5th birthday of flying domestically throughout New Zealand.

The first Jetstar domestic flight took off from Auckland, bound for Wellington on 10 June 2009. Since then, the airline has clocked up over 45,000 domestic flights and carried more than 7.5 million passengers around New Zealand, with over 5 million of these passengers flying in and out of Auckland.

Charles Spillane Auckland Airport's acting general manager aeronautical commercial congratulated the airline on five years of successful domestic operations in New Zealand.

"Auckland is Jetstar's busiest domestic airport with nearly 200 Jetstar flights a week to and from Auckland Airport. The Landing is one of six precincts that make up The District at Auckland Airport. It houses a number of warehouses as well as distribution and logistics facilities.
